Mo church was consecrated in 1839. Earlier there was a stave church from the 1200s. A large restoration was done in 1961.

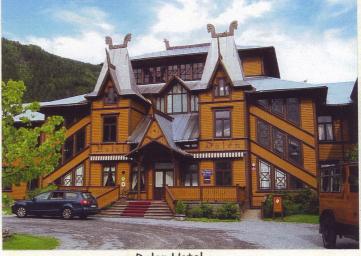
The altar table is from the stave church. It was restored by Magnus Lunde and Olav Johre and painted by Finn Kraft, Henrik Sørensen and Harald Kihle. The crucifix is from approximately 1400, the baptismal font is from the stave church, and the candle chandelier is from 1766.

In the church yard, there is a memorial stone over Torbjørg Ripilen who sang from the Draumkvædet for Moltke Moe.



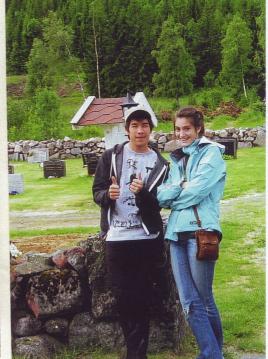

The flame burns in Morgedal day and night in memory of Sondre Norheim and the Olympic ceremonies held in Morgedal.

The torch was lit in Morgedal for the Winter Olympics in Oslo (1952), Squaw Valley (1960) and Lillehammer (1994). This was in honor of Sondre Norheim, who is known as the "father of modern skiing". Sondre redesigned the ski, making it narrower in the middle. He developed toe bindings from birch tree roots that increased the maneuverability of skis and permitted them to be used for downhill, jumping and cross-country. He developed the Telemark and stem-christie turns. (named after Christiania, now Oslo). Sondre and the Morgedal skiers won many prizes in Telemark and Christiania. In the late 1800's, our cousins. Olav and Sveinung Drangstveit were among those skiers





Painting of Byggland farm, Morgedal, before 1800. The stabbur (far right) was sold when bldgs were relocated.



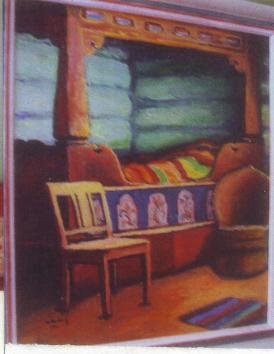

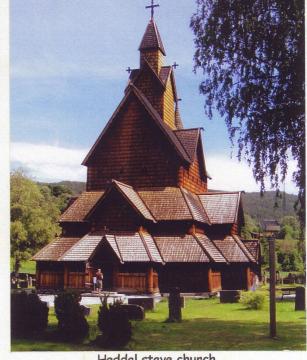

STAVE CHURCHES IN NORWAY

Traveling Norwegians must from early times have seen both wooden and stone churches abroad, which were of various sizes and constructions. Craftsmen, who accompanied long expeditions to maintain the boats and to erect storage buildings and houses at their destinations, may have worked on local construction teams and learned foreign practices. Features of foreign building practice may therefore have been current around Norway long before the attempt to convert the country to Christianity.

During the Christianization period in Norway, wooden churches and chapels were built. Traces have been found of over 30 of what are presumed to have been churches or chapels with a corner post structure. From the end of the 11th century, stone churches were also built, and more than 150 stone churches out of perhaps 300 in total have been preserved. But in Norway more churches were built of wood than of stone. Out of perhaps over a thousand originally, 28 stave churches have been preserved.

It is not known from how many alternative designs the builders were able to choose, when building the early Norwegian wooden churches. The type that has so far been uncovered by archaeological excavation consists of buildings with posts dug into the earth. Posts are the vertical, roof-bearing timbers that were placed in excavated post holes. Staves are the vertical, load-bearing timbers in the building. The frame of a stave church wall consists of a sill, staves and a top sill, and these have grooves to receive the wall planks. Many had no windows, relying instead on a small circular opening, placed high on the wall, for light and ventilation. As far as we know, the wooden churches of Norway from medieval times are a complicated mixture of different European and Middle Eastern traditions, together with the older local building practices of Norway.

In general there was a churchyard around the parish church, of a suitable size for the requirements of the congregation. New churches may often have been located at the same place as the older church buildings, as this minimized the disturbance to earlier graves. If the churchyard was also new, it was ideally blessed at the same time as the consecration of the church. The bishop's consecration of the building and blessing of the surrounding area must have been seen as creating a sanctuary, in principle confirmed and guaranteed by the king.
